DON'T FORGET









Always wear your facemask

Wash and sanitize Keep your distance Take care of yourself

FULLY VACCINATED

2 WEEKS AFTER YOUR FINAL SHOT

It takes time for your body to build immunity after any vaccination. COVID-19 vaccines may not protect you until two weeks after your second shot (Moderna and Pfizer) or first shot (Johnson & Johnson).

Common Side Effects

On the arm where you got the shot:



- Pain
- Redness
- Swelling

Throughout the rest of your body:



- Tiredness
- Headache
- Muscle pain
- Chills
- Fever
- Nausea

Side effects may feel like flu and even affect your ability to do daily activities, but they should go away in a few days.

You should get the second shot (if it is a 2 shot series) even if you have side effects after the first shot, unless your PCM tells you not to get it.

When to call your PCM

If you think you might be having a severe allergic reaction after leaving the vaccination site



Call DSN 911 or 098-911-9111 from a cell phone

If your side effects do not seem to be going away 48 hours or if the redness or tenderness where you got the shot increases after 24 hours

>>> Contact your PCM

If you experience:

- Cough
- Shortness of breath
- Difficulty breathing
- New loss of taste or smell
- Sore throat



Most Side Effects Can Be Managed At Home

To reduce pain and discomfort where you got the shot



- Apply a clean, cool, wet washcloth over the area.
- Use or exercise your arm.

To reduce discomfort from fever



- Drink plenty of fluids.
- · Dress lightly.
